## What's Happening in the Park in Summer Flowering now:

- Fringe lily *Thysanotus species*
- the Marri Redgum (Corymbia calophylla) is covered with pale yellow blossom
- the snakebush, Hemiandra pungens
   (groundcover opposite the main carpark as you
   enter the Wildflower Walk) is covered with the
   mauve flowers so loved by the bobtail lizards

**Birds and Reptiles:** There have been several sightings of bobtail lizards eating the purple flowers of the snakebush

The Rainbow Bee-eaters which visit Wireless Hill each Spring/Summer from northern Australia and New Guinea to breed are getting ready to leave with their young.

## News:

The Friends of Wireless Hill have received a grant from the Swan Alcoa Landcare Program to employ part-time contractors to help us with our hand weeding efforts.

The City of Melville agreed in 2007 to allow the Friends to manage the weeds in the area of best condition bushland (map at right) and to cease spraying in this area.

This grant will allow us to more quickly remove perennial and annual veldt grass, love grass, gladioli and other weeds from this area and hopefully to expand into adjoining areas.

The Friends of Wireless Hill have partnered with SERCUL (South East Regional Centre for Urban Landcare) who have provided Tracy Evans Landcare Officer, team leader, John Maliunas, Landcare Project Officer, and Jake Usher, Landcare Trainee. The team will usually work every second Wednesday over the following year.
